FUNERAL OF F. BLAKE.

Civil War Veteran and Old Resident
of Indianapolis.

The funeral of Frederick Blake, seventy-six years old, who died Saturday morning of old age, was held this afternoon at his home, 23 North Noble street.

Mr. Blake was born in Baden, Germany, and came to this country in 1851, settling at Pittsburg, where he was married. At the breaking out of the civil war he enlisted, and served until the close. After receiving his discharge he moved with his family to Columbus, O., and worked at his trade as a tailor until 1868, when he came to this city. For a short time after coming here he followed his trade, and afterward took a position as night watchman with William F. Piel, at the National starch-works. For thirty-three years he held this position, and only left it when he became too feeble to attend to his duties. He was one of the oldest members of the Red Men, and belonged to several other societies. His wife and three children survive him.
